

Visitor Guidelines

Please:

- Follow all signs, notices, instructions and directions given by staff or volunteers.
- Look after your personal property and try not to obstruct doorways, staircases or pathways.
- Be considerate and behave in a manner that does not cause offence to others. The Centre can become very crowded at times.
- Do not eat, drink, smoke (or use e cigarettes) in the Museum.
- Do not touch objects within open displays.

Please be aware:

- Unaccompanied children aged 14 or over are welcome if they are behaving appropriately and are in small groups (fewer than 6). Anyone under 14 must be accompanied by an adult.
- Parents, guardians and carers remain responsible for their children whilst in the Museum even if they are unaccompanied.
- The Museum retains the right to refuse admission or remove any person who behaves in a manner likely to affect the enjoyment or safety of others
- Photography in the Museum is allowed for personal, non-commercial purposes only.
- All our staff and volunteers are identifiable from their lanyards.
- For security and safety reasons closed circuit television is in use throughout the building.
- New Forest Centre makes every effort to ensure the museum exhibits and gallery are open to the public. However, the Centre reserves the right to close areas on occasion.

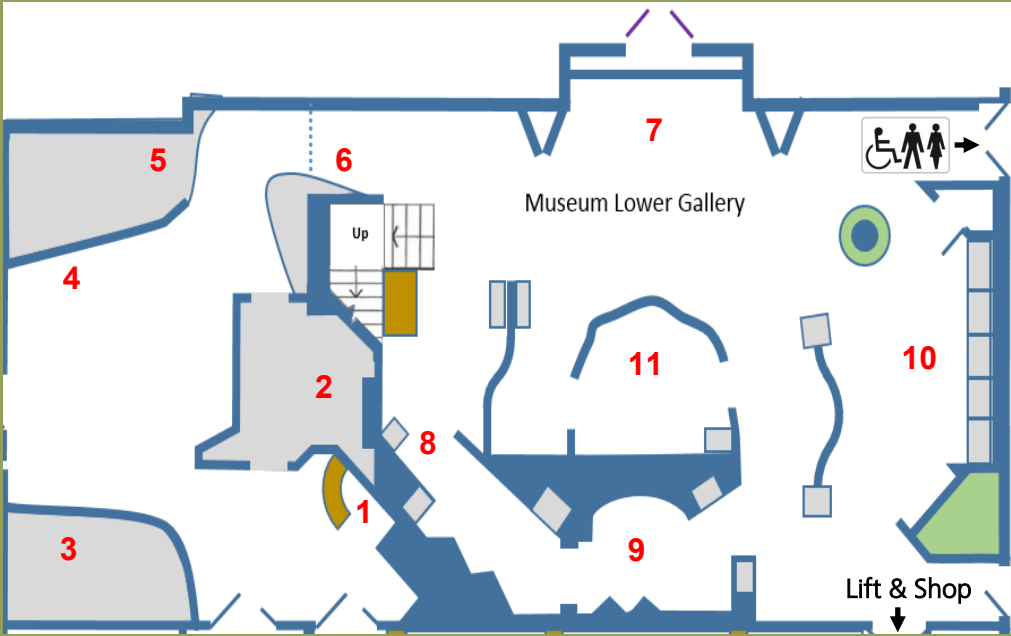
Museum Lower Gallery

- 1 Volunteer Desk: Please ask our helpful volunteers for any assistance or additional information.
- 2 Cob Cottage: An example of a cob building.
- 3 Pony Sales Yard: A model of the sales yard at Beaulieu Road Station.
- 4 Introductory Video: A 9 minute introductory video with commentary and subtitles and a 6 minute break between showings.
- 5 Forestry Old and New: Models showing different forestry workers and their tools along with additional information.
- 6 Leaflets and Quiz Sheets: Free information leaflets along with quiz and colouring sheets. Clipboards and pencils are provided. A small donation towards costs for these is always appreciated.
- 7 Children’s Play Area: Various activities for children including dressing up and story books.
- 8 World War II Area: Maps, artefacts and information showing the role the New Forest played in World War II.
- 9 Time Tunnel: Take a walk back in time into the New Forest’s history.
- 10 Natural History Exhibits: A chance to see what animals, insects and plants appear in five different New Forest habitats.
- 11 Family Tree: Interactive activities for all the family exploring New Forest people and nature.

- 1 Family Tree: Interactive activities for all the family exploring New Forest people and nature.
- 2 New Forest Embroidery: Created in 1979, this embroidery depicts many aspects of the New Forest and its history.
- 3 Alice in Wonderland’s Mirror: A large mirror that came from the house of Alice Hargreaves, the inspiration for Alice in Wonderland.
- 4 Temporary Exhibition Space: This display area changes annually.
- 5 Entrance to the New Forest Christopher Tower Reference Library: Open Wednesday 10am – 4pm and Friday 10am – 12.30pm.
